CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.

NAME AND PURPOSE

SECTION 1. The name of this Association shall be Tennessee Secondary School Athletic Association.

SECTION 2. The purpose of this organization shall be to stimulate and regulate the athletic relations of the secondary schools of Tennessee.

ARTICLE II

OFFICERS-DUTIES

SECTION 1. The officers of this Association shall consist of a President and a Secretary-Treasurer. They shall be elected annually as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 2. There shall be a Board of Control composed of nine members, three from each Grand Division of the State elected annually in mass meetings of the member schools of that Division called by the Chairman of that Division—each member school having one vote; and these nine members shall elect a President from their own number and a Secretary-Treasurer, who may or may not be a member of the Board of Control. These officers shall take office in April, following their election.

SECTION 3. All members of Board of Control must be principals or superintendents.

SECTION 4. The three members of the Board of Control from each Grand Division shall constitute a Divisional Committee with power to organize with its Chairman and Secretary and shall have jurisdiction over any question arising in its Grand Division. The decisions of the Divisional Committee shall be subject to appeal to the State Board of Control.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all regular and called meetings of the Association and to act as Chairman of the Board of Control. He shall have power to call special meetings upon the request of the Board of Control, or upon the request of the majority of the members of the Association.

SECTION 6. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep records of all meetings, attend to all correspondence, and handle the funds of the Association.

INTERPRETATIONS

Term is a period of either three or four and one-half months.

Current term is the report card period which is either four or six weeks.

Passing grade is 75 per cent in each subject.

Full unit is the credit value of a subject as recognized by the State Department of Education in Tennessee. Two one-half unit subjects as defined by the State Department in Tennessee may be valued as a whole unit. These one-half unit subjects may be carried concurrently or consecutively.

STUDENT DROPPED FROM SCHOOOL

SECTION 2. A student who drops out of school before the end of the term can in no way become eligible to play on a school team until he has been in school a full term and has passed in three subjects.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATE

SECTION 3. No student shall be eligible to play who has graduated from a four year high school.

TEN TERMS

SECTION 4 A student shall be ineligible to compete if he has attended a secondary school for ten terms of four and one-half months or fifteen terms of three months each. (Some schools have four and one-half months and others three months in the term). A student shall not play more than four seasons in any sport. Additional seasons on a team while a student was in the seventh or eighth grade prior to June 1st, 1926, shall not be counted. A student participating in athletics for any number seasons while attending a school with only nine grades shall have only one season charged against his record. Only two seasons shall be charged against his record if he played any number of seasons while attending a school with only ten grades. A student who has played in one first team game shall be regarded as having played for the season.

AGE LIMIT

SECTION 5. No student shall be eligible to play after he has reached his twenty-first birthday.

PLAY ON INDEPENDENT TEAMS

SECTION 6. After the opening of school in the fall participation on any independent team in baseball, basket ball, football, and track during the nine months school is in session will automatically render the student ineligible to participate in any form of high school athletics for a period of twelve calendar months from the day of his participation.

TEAMS WHICH MEMBER SCHOOLS CAN PLAY

SECTION 7. One alumni game and games with freshman college and junior college teams will be permitted. These games will count as a part of the ten games for girls and twelve games for boys in basket ball after January 1st. After January 1, 1931, the following rule is effective: No school in the Association will be permitted to play any school in Tennessee that is not a member of the Tennessee Secondary School Athletic Association nor shall it be permitted to play a school outside of Tennessee that is not a member of the high school athletic association of the state in which the school is located. Each school shall enforce the rules of its association.

TIME OF ENROLLMENT

SECTION 8. A student shall not participate in sports during any term unless he is duly enrolled by the twentieth day after beginning of the term. The Divisional Committee may make exceptions to this rule where its operation shall work a manifest injustice.

MIGRATORY RULES

SECTION 9. A student who transfers from one school to another shall be barred from competition for twelve calendar months from the date of transfer in the sport in which he has participated in one or more games unless the change is due to the change of residence of his parents or guardian or to the fact that he has completed the studies offered in the former school. A student completing the ninth, tenth or eleventh grade who, in so doing has completed the studies offered in that school shall be an exception to the migratory rule and may enter any school which offers higher grades. Students may go from a two year high school to a four year high school after one year in the two year school. The rule barring students shall not apply to students just entering the 9th grade by certificate from the 8th grade.

INTERPRETATION

If a student's parents move, said student will have to live at home if he, or she, participates in athletics. A change in bus route or change in highway will not affect the migratory rule in any way.

AMATEUR RULE

SECTION 10. The student shall be an amateur, one who has never used and is not using his knowledge of athletics or his athletic skill for gain and who has always contested under his own name.

INTERPRETATION

Playing on a team with a professional does not make said student a professional. (Officiating for money renders a student ineligible).

RULES OF THE GAME

SECTION 6. Boys' Basketball games shall be played under intercollegiate rules. Girls' Basketball games shall be played under Spalding's girls' rules.

DUTIES OF THE MANAGER

SECTION 7. Five days before each contest the manager of each team shall mail to the other a statement certified by the principal to the effect that the persons named are eligible, under the rules of the Association, to represent the school in the contest on the date specified. In case of a joint meet of several schools, certificates should be mailed to the authorities conducting the meet.

INFORMATION BY PRINCIPAL

SECTION 8. A principal shall, when requested, furnish to the Divisional Secretary or the State Secretary such information as may be desired bearing upon the eligibility of contestants from his school. A failure to comply within a reasonable time shall forfeit the school's membership in the Association.

REWARDS

SECTION 9. No student shall receive any reward of any kind having a commercial value of more than \$1.00 either as a direct or indirect compensation for athletic knowledge or skill in consequence of being on a school team. This rule shall not prohibit the acceptance of medals, cups, watch fobs, or high school letters. Acceptance of such forbidden rewards will bar the student from athletics for two years.

POST-SEASON GAMES

SECTION 10. No post-season games shall be played except with the permission of the State Secretary or Divisional Secretary. The football season shall end with the Thanksgiving week-end, basketball with the state tournament, and track and field and baseball with the closing week of each individual school.

NOTE: The Board of Contral has voted to sanction no more post-season games.

NUMBER OF GIRLS' TEAMS IN A TOURNAMENT

SECTION 11 Not more than sixteen girl teams shall be permitted to participate in a district or a state basketball tournament.

CONDUCT OF STUDENT

SECTION 12. A student using insulting or profane language, or who is guilty of foul tactics may be disqualified for that game by the referee in charge and shall be subject to such additional penalties as the Divisional Board of Control may deem best.

NET PROFITS OF TOURNAMENT

SECTION 13. The Board of Control through the State Secretary shall arrange for payment into the Association treasury in each county, district, grand division, or state tournament 25 per cent of the net proceeds.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICIALS AND CONTRACTS

SECTION 1. All contracts between schools shall be signed by the principals of the schools contracted, or by some one authorized by him.

SECTION 2. Visiting teams must be accompanied by the principal or some one designated by him.

SECTION 3. Officials must be agreed upon by both schools.

SECTION 4. In all games the home team shall properly supervise, police, and control the spectators by such means and arrangements as will insure a sportsmanlike contest.

ARTICLE V


AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

Suggested changes in the By-Laws will be submitted to all the schools in the Association to be voted upon by a written ballot. Two-thirds majority will be necessary to amend the By-Laws. When twenty-five members of the Association want a referendum on a question, it will be the duty of the president to instruct the secretary to carry out the referendum as described above, provided that not more than two such votes are called for during any one year. (The vote will be taken each year from September first to fifteenth, and from December first to fifteenth).

WINNING ESSAY 1930

GOOD SPORTSMANSHIP FOR STUDENTS AND OTHERS

(By Virginia Lewis, Central High School, Nashville)

A sportsman is one who is fair and generous in sports. When the word "sportsmanship" is mentioned, although one immediately pictures the foot ball gridiron, the base ball diamond, and the world of play, sportsmanship extends far beyond this field. In the business world, in the home, in the community-life and in society, well is a sportsman known and honored.

To be a sportsman in all the walks of life, one must first find a starting place. And that place is surely the school—in and at the contests of the school, where sportsmanship is revered, esteemed and placed on a far higher pedestal than victory. Although it is glorious to be hailed as a conquering football hero, how much more glorious is it to be pointed out as a sportsman, a man who never cheated in a game, who was always fair and generous to the opposing team, who would forfeit a game rather than make a false statement about a play.

In the school there are two kinds of sportsmanship: the sportsmanship displayed by the athlete in the game, and that of the spectator. Sportsmanship for the athlete has long been stressed to the neglect of sportsmanship for the spectator. It is the latter that now deserves attention.

The student spectator represents his school the same as does the athlete. The student who always finds time to be present at the games and to give of his best while there, serves his school, shows his respect for the team, and displays a degree of sportsmanship next in line to that of the man doing his best on the field. It is not necessary for the weakling and the person of ill-health to grow discouraged because he is not able to emulate the valiant hero who brings glorious victory to his school by his athletic power. He is showing the right school spirit and is a sportsman when he arrives to yell and stay with his team to the last. When the cheer-leader calls for yells he should respond with enthusiasm. It is not necessary to be urged to yell when the school team is winning: but when it is down and losing, that is the time for the spectator to show whether or not he is true-blue and worthy of his school. The man who gives applause only when the team is winning and hurls abuse when it is losing is a poor sport indeed; the one who expresses marked disapproval of such abusive statements displays the right sort of school spirit.

When the members of the visiting team arrive within the city, they should be treated as guest-friends, not as hostile enemies. The student shows his real self in the attitude he takes toward an opponent. He

should insist on the courteous treatment of the members of the opposing team as they pass through the streets or visit the local school building, and he himself should render aid and courtesy when he has an opportunity. He should never fail to recognize an exhibition of fine play or sportsmanship on the part of the visiting team. He should be as considerate of the injured on the other team as he is of those on the home team. To be loyal to the school is not to be abusive or hate the opponents. Rather is it a sign of greater loyalty to forget prejudice and treat them with the courtesy and respect that is their just due.

"To honor while you strike him down, The foe that comes with fearless eye—"

-that's a sport.

There is a sort of public sportsmanship that all the students can take part in. It is that in which they should form a kind of public opinion. They should insist on fair, courteous and truthful accounts of the athletic contest in the local papers. Although it is pleasing and flattering to hear the school, the team and the game praised in false terms in the papers, it is unfair to the visiting team to have such accounts published.

Those forming public opinion should advocate that any spectator who continually evidences poor sportsmanship be requested not to attend future contests.

They should acquaint the adults of the community and the grade pupils with the ideals of sportsmanship that are acceptable to the high school. These should be familiar with the state rules of eligibility and support their strict enforcement. To encourage the full discussion of fair play, sportsmanship and school spirit through class work and auditorium programs in order to discover ways in which students can develop and demonstrate good sportsmanship; to impress upon the community its respnsibility for the exercise of self-control and fair play at all athletic contests; to express disapproval of rough play or poor sportsmanship on the part of the players representing the school; to learn the rules of the various athletic games so that either as spectators or critics they will be intelligent: these are ways in which spectators and all the students can show sportsmanship.

On the field, a sportsman accepts the decisions of officials without question. Above all, he recognizes that the good name of the school is more valuable than any game won by unfair play.

A few years ago Vanderbilt was in the midst of a close game when a play was made about which neither the referee nor the players could decide. They asked a player whether the ball hit him, and, although he could have as easily denied it he answered in the affirmative. His name has gone down in the history of the school as a conquering hero. Even though a great game was lost for Vanderbilt, a noble victory was won.
